COMMUNITY GRANTS 2023 IMPACT REPORT

Dear friend,

Throughout 2019 and 2020, organizations from across Canada came together to develop the country's first ocean literacy strategy. One of the priority actions identified in the National Strategy was to establish a community grants program. Even then, we knew how essential celebrating and supporting community efforts is to advancing ocean literacy in meaningful, place-based ways. There is no-one-size-fits all approach.

In February 2023, we had the pleasure of launching the first Ocean Literacy Community Grants program, together with four partner organizations, including Entremission, Water Rangers, Ocean Networks Canada, and the Government of Canada. Funding was made possible in part through the Oceans Management Contribution Program.

Interest in the program exceeded our expectations, as did the quality of the programming experiences taking place in communities across the country. Twentyeight grant recipients were selected from a pool of 146 applications by a national advisory committee. The inaugural grants supported Ocean Week Canada 2023 events in June. Grant recipients used a variety of approaches, including arts, shoreline explorations, hands-on learning, community science, and knowledgesharing between generations and cultures.

Their messages emphasized our connection with the ocean, including our impact on the ocean, the ocean's role in planetary health, climate, and human health, as well as the relationship between our communities, local waterways, and the global ocean.

Topics they explored included threats such as pollution, plastics, wastewater, climate change, and knowledge of navigation, food, geography. Stewardship and Indigenous-led conservation were dominant themes.

The impact of these first community grants continues to ripple across the country. With less than 20% of the total applicants receiving grants, the interest and need for this kind of community support and collaboration is clear. We are excited and committed to growing this wave of ocean literacy community-led initiatives. Two open calls for grant applications will be taking place in late 2023 and early 2024. We hope you will join us in this effort.

The Grants program was co-designed from November, 2022 to January, 2023 with a multi-partner national team. Promotion and an open call for grant applications took place in February. Review and selection took place in March, with all 28 awarded community initiatives taking place in May-June as part of Ocean Week Canada 2023.

















GRANT RECIPIENTS

Applicants could request funds ranging from \$500 to \$3,000. A diverse representation of geography, language, Indigenous-led, and freshwater (inland) connections were priority focuses for the inaugural grants awarded, along with ensuring a broad range of event types, topics, and engagement approaches.


